David Muyres is an experienced innovation and product development leader with a passion for creatively solving new mobility challenges. He has held functional and executive management positions in Europe, Asia and North America across the automotive industry. In addition to his broad corporate experience, he has also held leadership positions in academia, started non-profits, and partnered in a consulting office in Washington, DC.

Mr. Muyres also served as Vice President, Educational Initiatives, for the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, California, the world's leading automotive design school. In this capacity, he was responsible for developing new strategic offerings for the college. He also created and facilitated the Art Center's Summits, a series of annual events focused on sustainable mobility and the future of how people move around the planet.

David Muyres is currently the Chief Commercial Officer and Co-Founder of Streetscape, a start-up focused on safety in the new mobility world. Previously he was responsible for Global Product Innovation, Consumer Research and Advanced Technology teams at Yanfeng Automotive, a Director at the Global Corporate Innovation Center at Johnson Controls in Milwaukee, WI and the Vice President, Educational Initiatives, for Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, CA. In December 2008, Mr. Muyres was asked to provide testimony on the future of the automotive industry to Rep. Ed Markey's House Select Committee on Energy Independence and Global Warming in Washington, DC.

From serving in the White House and the Department of Defense's Office of Environmental Security to joining a startup that was acquired by Constellation Energy. She has demonstrated a deep commitment to environmental sustainability and policy. Ann's role at Carbon War Room and AIG Environmental underscores her expertise in commercial ventures aimed at addressing climate-related challenges. Additionally, Ann's involvement in political campaigns and board memberships at Solar1 and the NY League of Conservation Voters highlights her dedication to driving change at the intersection of business and environmentalism. Throughout her career, she has excelled in shaping sales and marketing strategies, facilitating fundraising efforts, and advising on impact investing, showcasing a multifaceted skill set tailored to addressing complex global climate issues.

Ladeene Freimuth, Owner and President, The Freimuth Group, LLC.

Ms. Freimuth is the founder and President of The Freimuth Group, LLC (TFG), a domestic and international energy and environmental consulting firm, now in its eighteenth year, that focuses on policy and strategic advising, advocacy, research and analysis, and project design, implementation, and management for a range of trade association, not-for-profit, and corporate clients. Her areas of expertise include clean energy, energy efficiency, grid modernization, alternative transportation technologies, global climate change, sustainable development, water resource management, and the nexus with national security issues. Ms. Freimuth also recently served as a Global Fellow at the Woodrow Wilson Center.

Ms. Freimuth possesses nearly thirty years of work experience, including with the U.S. Congress, the U.S. Agency for International Development, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, consulting firms, and overseas. During her time in Congress, she authored major pieces of legislation, including the first bill to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from power plants; industry, consensus-based energy efficiency appliance standards; and, alternative fuel and transportation technology measures.

In a remote area of Siberia, Ms. Freimuth managed all aspects of a multi-faceted, joint U.S.-Russian project to help clean up an ecological disaster zone that is saving nearly 20 lives per year. As Deputy Director of EcoPeace Middle East's Israel Office, she managed, directed, and helped implement transboundary water management projects among Israelis, Palestinians, and Jordanians as a means toward peacebuilding.

She served as a Term Member of the Council on Foreign Relations, including on the Advisory Committee. Ms. Freimuth possesses Russian, French, and Hebrew language skills, and received a B.A. in Government from Wesleyan University and a master's degree from The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University in Natural Resource Management and Eurasian Studies, having spent one semester of her graduate studies at the Johns Hopkins' School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS).

Larry Schweiger, former President & CEO, Nation Wildlife Federation

Larry Schweiger has been President and CEO of three environmental organizations, including the National Wildlife Federation, Western Pennsylvania Conservancy, and PennFuture. He headed the 4.5-million-member National Wildlife Federation for ten years and served in various NWF positions for fourteen years. Under Schweiger's leadership, fighting climate change was the Federation's top priority. Larry earlier served as the Federation's senior vice president of conservation programs and in other Federation capacities, including publisher for National Wildlife, International Wildlife, and Ranger Rick.

Schweiger is an award-winning author of two books. His first book, *Last Chance: Preserving Life on Earth*, won first prize for science and nonfiction at the Next Generation Indie Book Awards in 2011. His latest book is *Climate Crisis and Corrupt Politics: Overcoming the Forces that Threaten our Future*.

Larry's tenure as President of the Federation was marked by determined efforts to safeguard the nation's wildlife against climate change and other ecological threats. Larry worked with former Vice President Al Gore and helped launch Climate Reality and the Climate Reality Action Fund. Larry serves on the executive committee of Climate Reality and chairs the Climate Reality Action Fund. Collaborating with the late Senator John Heinz, Larry played a critical role in the passage of the 1990 Clean Air Act amendments to curb acid rain through a cap-and-trade strategy and to control toxic air emissions. He spent thirty days on the Gulf of Mexico in the middle of the BP spill to get the story of America's largest oil spill to the public and later successfully promoted the "Restore Act" to use 80 percent of the BP penalty funds to restore the Gulf Coast.

The Blue Green Alliance presented Larry with their "Right Stuff" Award for his leadership on the auto fuel efficiency rules. These rules were to cut pollution and energy use in half by 2025 while enabling the auto industry to recover from market collapse and bankruptcy. Emission reductions actually outpaced the rules when Trump gutted them.

Schweiger started his career with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as the executive director of the Joint Legislative Air and Water Pollution Control and Conservation Committee for the Pennsylvania General Assembly. In the 1970s, Larry was variously involved in passing twenty-eight environmental laws over nearly ten years.

Larry drafted the Wild Resources Conservation Act, a critical tool to protect Pennsylvania's threatened and endangered plants and animals. He wrote the provisions of the Game Law to create a restricted bear license fund that funded black bear research and management, advancing a dramatic black bear recovery and expansion in Pennsylvania.

Schweiger was the founding chair of the National Institute for Conservation Leadership, an organization dedicated to strengthening volunteer leadership in America's conservation and environmental organizations. Larry also acted as the founding executive director of the Friends of Gettysburg National Parks and first proposed a new museum.

Waynesburg University honored Larry with a Doctor of Humane Letters for his many conservation efforts.
